Our Self-Evaluation Report and Improvement Plan

In the last year, we have looked at teaching and learning in our school to find out what we are doing well. This is what we discovered:

We are implementing a lot of great initiatives throughout the school, for example;

- Literacy Lift off (Senior Infants -2nd)
- Graded Readers (Junior Infants-1st)
- Ready Set Go Maths (Junior and Senior Infants)
- Book Club (4th-6th)
- Building Bridges of Comprehension (All classes)
- Aistear (Junior and Senior Infants)
- Engage Readers (2nd-5th)
- Friendship Terrace (Junior Infants)
- Fun Friends (Senior Infants)
- Friends for Life (5th)

This is what we did to find out what we were doing well, and what we could do better:

We surveyed some classes using Survey Monkey, the girls answered questions based on their perception of their own learning in Reading, Writing and Oral Language.

We interview a number of teachers to gauge their perception of the New Language Curriculum.

This is what we are now going to work on:

Writing genres, recognising different genres and producing a piece of work from a particular genre.

The genres are;

Recount: our news, summaries

Narrative: a story

Persuasive: debate, letter to a Minister, advertisements

Explanation: how something works or is made e.g. honey

Procedural: recipes, instructions on how to play a game

Report: book report, review

This is what you can do to help:

Junior Classes:

- Talk about different routines/procedures your daughter completes on a daily basis e.g. brushing teeth, get ready for school, crossing the road

- expose your daughter to a variety of genres when reading together

-discuss the different element of familiar stories – beginning, middle, end, characters etc.

-ask your daughter for a recount of her day at school!

Senior Classes:

- Encourage your daughter to read from a variety of genres.

- Use newspaper or online news to find news items written in different genres

- Look out for writing genres in everyday life e.g. billboard advertisements are usually persuasive.

Here is some information about how we are carrying out our work and about what the Department of Education and Skills requires us to do.
